

COVID-19 Visitation Protocol Guidance Tool

<h3>Vaccinated Residents</h3>	<h3>Unvaccinated Residents</h3>	<h3>Additional Accommodation</h3>
<p>In-apartment visitation may be arranged with the following considerations in accordance with the state and local health authorities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Screening with no signs or symptoms of COVID-19 (e.g. temp, cough, etc.). • Visitors do not need to provide proof of the COVID vaccine or a negative COVID-19 test • Hand hygiene upon arrival, departure and as needed during visit. • Proper use of surgical face mask (covering mouth and nose). • Adhere to limited number of visitors per resident at one time. Maximum visitors per visit is 2 and no age requirement (must be able to correctly wear mask). • Limit the movement in the community. For example, visitors should not walk around different halls of the community. Rather, they should go directly to the resident's room or designated visitation area. • Fully vaccinated residents can have close contact with the visitor (hugs, hand holding). Both resident and visitor must continue to wear a well-fitted mask and perform hand hygiene before and after contact. 	<p>In-apartment visitation may be arranged with the following considerations in accordance with the state and local health authorities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Visitors must provide proof of completion of full COVID vaccine series or provide proof of a negative COVID-19 test within the previous 7 days to the community. • No in-room visitation if the COVID-19 county positivity rate is >10% and <80% of residents in the community are fully vaccinated. • All visitors are screened with the following considerations: No signs or symptoms of COVID-19 (e.g. temp, cough, etc.) • Hand hygiene upon arrival, departure and as needed during visit • Proper use of surgical face mask (covering mouth and nose) • Adhere to limited number of visitors per resident at one time. Maximum visitors per visit is 2 and no age requirement (must be able to correctly wear mask). • Limit the movement in the community. For example, visitors should not walk around different halls of the community. Rather, they should go directly to the resident's room or designated visitation area. 	<p>Visitors who are unable to participate in the COVID infection prevention protocol should not be permitted to participate in 'In room' visitations. For visitors not able to participate in the previously stated considerations, please take part in our outdoor visits or the Century Park Connection Room (See Century Connection Room Protocol).</p> <p>While end-of-life situations have been used as examples of compassionate care situations, the term "compassionate care situations" does not exclusively refer to end-of-life situations. Examples of other types of compassionate care situations include, but are not limited to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A resident, who was living with their family before recently being admitted to a nursing home, is struggling with the change in environment and lack of physical family support. • A resident who is grieving after a friend or family member recently passed away. • A resident who needs cueing and encouragement with eating or drinking, previously provided by family and/or caregiver(s), is experiencing weight loss or dehydration. • A resident, who used to talk and interact with others, is experiencing emotional distress, seldom speaking, or crying more frequently (when the resident had rarely cried in the past).
